Dear Fellow Members,

We have had a wonderful start to the year with several magnificent displays and social events. In February we were shown a superb Postal History exhibit by Gary Diffen on the Australian Light Horse Campaign. 38 people attended including several visitors. The fact we introduced our first exhibit for the year with champagne and nibbles may have helped to swell the numbers.

Our March catalogue auction was very successful with 73% of lots being sold and the July catalogued auction also has many rare and interesting items – something for everyone! We were successful in producing photos of key items in the March auction and we will be showing more photos for the July auction.

As was mentioned in the March auction catalogue a great deal of material collected by Ian Dennehy, a BPS Fellow and long-time member, was offered for sale. Ian has been a life-long collector of Japan and Australia BCOF and there is more outstanding material for sale in the July auction. If you cannot attend the auction, please take advantage of the postal bid option that is attached to the last page of the catalogue.

In April the VPC Congress was held at BriPhil House and again we were treated to some outstanding exhibits with several fulltime dealers in attendance. An information session was held to outline the activities of the VPC (Victorian Philatelic Council) and a healthy discussion followed concerning the future of the hobby and how we can all work together to ensure small stamp clubs continue to operate.

Looking ahead on June 13 we have an International Gold Medal exhibit by Mark Diserio titled 'Victoria – Envelopes embossed with the 2d De La Rue Die 1869-1885'. Our members put an enormous amount of time into producing these exhibits for your enjoyment, so I am seeking an excellent attendance on that evening. The Daytime meeting will be held on June 20th at 10.00am with exchange sheets, a mini-auction and a great opportunity to socialize with other stamp collectors in a very relaxed setting. June closes with a Tuesday night auction at 7.00pm on the 27th. Elsewhere in this Bulletin you will read the exciting news that we have two new convenors for our Exchange Branch. This is one of the major attractions for collectors to join BPS and we are delighted that this service will continue.

During the past six months several of our members have submitted exhibits for national and international Philatelic Exhibitions and have been very successful. We congratulate those members for the time (and expense) involved in preparing these exhibits and

thank them for establishing the reputation of BPS as more than just a 'stamp auction club'.

Further on in this Bulletin you will read of our forthcoming Stamp Fair which will be held on Saturday 7th and Sunday 8th October. Discussion Point: The State of Philatelic Education

When I refer to "philatelic education", I mean the general philatelic knowledge of "average" collectors, the means available for collectors to increase their knowledge, and the dysfunction in the hobby that may limit collectors' educational opportunities. Back

in the "good old days", collectors learned from one another, often at stamp club meetings or stamp shows, as well as being able to visit the local neighbourhood stamp shop where one could ask questions of the dealer. Many shop-based dealers went out of their way to educate new collectors.

Many of those opportunities for in-person interaction are long gone. Stamp shows are fewer and/or more difficult to attend. Stamp clubs are also fewer as their traditional membership base has aged and newer collectors have been less likely to participate in such activities. I surely don't have to say that there are extremely few stamp shops still operating. Discussing what has led this reality is a subject for another time.

There have long been, but especially in the 1940s-1980s, philatelic "how to" books published, targeted to the new collector. They were and are all extremely useful, however, it seems that -- at least these days --very few new or intermediate collectors will sit down and actually read such a book (and thus get a broad base of knowledge, rather than just an answer to a specific question).

As the Internet developed, there was, for a while, a sense that the Internet could be the saviour of philatelic education. Using the Internet, one can have discussions with other collectors 24/7/365 and learn from other collectors located all around the world. The ability for content creators and all users to combine text, images, and videos, and hyperlink to a huge range of resources, seemed like it would be the perfect solution and perhaps even be better than the "old way". Unfortunately, human nature intervened as it usually does. One of the fundamental problems with the Internet as a solution to the dearth of philatelic education is that, while the Internet is very good at getting specific answers to specific questions, the Internet is not so good at educating collectors about subjects that they were not even aware that they needed to (or would want to) know more about. It is a "if you look you will find" kind of situation. However, if you don't know to look, and if you are not a person who just naturally spends hours exploring web pages on the Internet, then you are not as likely to be exposed to new philatelic methods, ideas, concepts, etc.

Another aspect of the way that we currently tend to use the Internet is that, except for active participation in discussion forums, we use the Internet's resources in very passive ways. For example, for many reasons, most collectors tend not to post images of their album pages on the Internet -- thus they don't get any feedback on what they are doing or how they are doing it.

Of course, when properly used, search engines and following links on web pages can be an enormously valuable resource. However, using such resources requires a different process and mindset than may be typically employed by a new collector. Also, many of the search engine results tend to lead the new collector to commercial websites that are trying to sell stamps rather than to educate. There are a range of "general philatelic" websites available that do have the goal to educate. Some of them are really good. Others were started with a lot of energy, but eventually ran out of steam. The challenge with these websites seems to have been PROMOTION. Unfortunately, with all the billions of web pages that people could look at, getting people to actively, rather than passively (just to get a specific question answered) use such web pages/sites requires making collectors aware that these sites exist. And that is very hard to do.

Without PROMOTION -- which requires dedicating a large number of hours to the process of letting the world know about your website -- one could have the best stamp

education website in the world but very few people would actually know about it and use it. Sometimes "build it and they will come" is not enough. There have been a variety of attempts of philatelic organizations, including dealers' organizations, to work with the venues to create and promote philatelic education content. However, these seem to have been short-lived, and usually die whenever there is a management change at the venue.
